Station hosted the inaugural TMinus 10-Miler on 10 December
2022. The run included over 2,200
runners and 600 virtual
participants. Runners took in
views from the ITL to the
Lighthouse. The annual event will
continue to celebrate the past,
present, and future of America's
Premier Gateway to Space and the
U.S. Space Force.

DID YOU KNOW?



The Jupiter IRBM program enjoyed an impressive career in Cape history, from the earliest missile testing to Apollo 7. America's first successful full-size reentry vehicle in space launched on a Jupiter. The earliest bioflights, satellites, and space probes launched on Jupiter variants. Even Saturn I included a Jupiter tank core on its first stage, connecting the Apollo Program to Jupiter's impressive resume.



POLARIS SCRAPBOOK DONATION

The Museum's artifact and archival collections continue to grow with plenty of unique donations. Museum staff recently accepted an oversized scrapbook containing original photos, documents, news clippings, and more pertaining to the entire Polaris SLBM program. ARTEMIS I LAUNCH VIEWING


Artemis I launched from LC-39B on Kennedy Space Center on 16 November 2022 after several previous attempts. Museum staff, volunteers, and others viewed the launch at 0147 EST from Hangar C. 
LC-14 BLOCKHOUSE RENOVATIONS


