Inaugural IMD Festival



The inaugural International Moon Day Festival took place at the Sands Space History Center on 20 July. The event celebrated the anniversary of the first Moon landing in 1969 and connected to an annual global celebration of Moon exploration.


This particular event was held as part of our ongoing CAPE Series of programming. It featured hands-on STEAM-based activity stations facilitated by scores of community partners. Activities included robotics, a drone simulator, rocket construction and launch, coloring stations, and much more. Some of the community partners who participated included the National Center for Simulation, National Space Society, DoD STARBASE Central Florida, Florida Space Institute, and coordination by the World Innovation Network.

This free event also included a special presentation by Jean Wright, space pioneer and seamstress for the Space Shuttle Program. She presented to the Museum a custom-made spacesuit for Rupert the Space Armadillo! Participants received an additional surprise with a live direct link and Q&A session with astronaut Jeanette Epps on the International Space Station.

DID YOU KNOW?



Prior to the use of our sophisticated tracking systems for rocket launch activity, sky screens were employed for range safety. They took many forms, but mainly consisted of two vertical parallel wires in a frame on a stand. The sky screen would be positioned a mile behind the launch pad with an operator calling out the track of the rocket/missile to a Range Safety Officer.

Message from the Director James W. Draper



I am thrilled and honored to announce that the Cape Canaveral Space Force Museum was awarded the inaugural Space Force Heritage Award! This Department of the Air Force-level honor "recognizes outstanding accomplishments... by personnel to foster a better understanding and appreciation of their Service, its history, and its accomplishments while building esprit de corps."

We won this prestigious award through substantial exhibit redesigns and renovations at multiple facilities last year. That included 32 new storyboards meticulously researched, written, designed, fabricated, and installed at the Sands Space History Center. Eight new outdoor interpretive panels were mounted throughout the Cape at key historic sites. We installed oversized maps presenting the unique, rich history of the Cape at four different facilities. Finally, updated panels in the Exhibit Hall now inform visitors on the early development of modern rocketry. All these enhancements incorporate QR codes for interactive "deeper dives" into the historical content on our website.

This monumental accomplishment illustrates the importance we place on teamwork. It involved support from Museum staff, volunteers, the Foundation team, and mission partners. Special thanks to Museum Curator Bill Paul (ret.) and Museum Volunteer Roger McCormick for taking on much of the heavy lift. Other museum volunteers assisted with research, editing, and image selection. The result of all these efforts – an updated and more engaging presentation of historical content the Museum has not seen in many years! What a transformation! Five years ago, when I came on board, we spent nearly a year clearing up countless deficiencies. The Museum had emerged from a period of low morale and general malaise. We gimbaled to a new, more promising trajectory. Within a few short years (and through a global pandemic) we accelerated to becoming one of the premier museum operations in the U.S. Space Force! Our supporting Foundation continues to build a support network and creative team that will propel us to substantial expansion.

Another sign of increased momentum in history and heritage programs locally includes Wade Scrogham, Director, Historical Reporting Programs, Space Launch Delta 45. He joined the Delta in recent years and he also received a Space Force Heritage Award for "superior historical and heritage services". We congratulate Mr. Scrogham for his achievement and his contributions to the Delta's history programs.

You hear this from me all the time – we are just getting started! Wait till you see what's next. Until then, I want to thank our Foundation team, mission partners, and our everindustrious museum volunteers for making this an award-winning enterprise. Semper Supra!

The last of the kiosks were finally removed at LC-26 and LC-14 in recent weeks. Their removal improves the appearance and presentation of our important historic sites. 
Bombs Away!

The U.S. Navy was very active in this region before and during World War II. Besides the Banana River Naval Air Station located where Patrick Space Force Base sits today, several water and land bombing targets dotted Cape Canaveral. Recent construction activities unearthed several target bombs. The local EOD Flight secured them and donated one nearly intact bomb to the Museum! It provides a unique glimpse into the wartime history of the area. (*To the left is an image of the WWII target bomb donated to the Museum.*)



Discover Deltiology

Did you know that deltiology is the hobby of collecting and studying postcards? It's the third largest hobby behind collecting stamps and coins/currency. Hangar C All-Call

Titan Trauma

An inspection of Museum facilities and grounds after the outer bands of Hurricane Debbie struck the area uncovered very little damage. Once exception was the Titan I display near Pad 26A. The acrylic cover protecting the engine compartment of the second stage became dislodged from the high winds. Jamie Draper and Roger McCormick quickly improvised a seal to prevent any further damage to the display. ULA Donation

In July United Launch Alliance (ULA) donated a great piece of history to the Museum. It was an oversized, stainless steel display case from the blockhouse at Launch Complex 37. It houses some mission coins, patches, flag, and a rocket model. The backdrop is signed by many who worked historic launches from the pad. 


Space Collectibles Show & Sale
